Concord College is England's premier co-educational international boarding school set in the heart of the Shropshire countryside, around 9 miles from Shrewsbury and 14 miles from Telford and with 572 students aged 13-19. Girls and boys between the ages of 13 and 19 enjoy fabulous facilities on our safe and beautiful 73-acre campus set in the heart of the English countryside. The main campus comprises a combination of historic and modern buildings, beautiful parkland, formal gardens and sports fields. Students achieve the highest standards and have a superb track record in gaining entry to top universities in the UK and around the world. Concord takes care to nurture the individuality of students to develop their self-confidence, encouraging all to understand the needs of others and to respect the values of the Concord community.

Academic achievements

The College is highly academic and students consistently achieve excellent 'A' level results. In 2022 48.6% of students achieved A*, 81.3% A*/A and 92.6% A*- B.

Concord History

Concord College was established in 1949 to promote international understanding by bringing together students from across the world. Formerly situated in Tunbridge Wells, it moved to its present site in 1973 to provide room for expansion and in 1983 it became a charitable trust. Over 120 countries are represented by the alumni. As an independent boarding school, the College is a member of the Independent Schools Council and the Boarding Schools Association.

Culture

Bahasa Melayu and English are the most commonly spoken languages in Malaysia with Mandarin Chinese, Tamil and other Asian languages being popularly spoken. In addition to the variety of languages spoken, a range of food from different cultures can be easily accessed in Malaysia. One has access, particularly in Kuala Lumpur to a selection of international food including restaurants and supermarkets that sell western items and brands.

Malaysia is a predominately Muslim nation while other groups including Hindus, Buddhists, Christians, and practitioners of Chinese indigenous religions coexist peacefully in the country. It is important to respect the customs of Malaysia which include being mindful that some may not be comfortable shaking hands with the opposite gender and opting to bow with the hand to the heart as a formal greeting.

Cost of living and accommodation

The cost of living is relatively affordable, making it an attractive destination for expats. Housing is reasonable and there are many options in terms of where to live and types of accommodation. Residences with gym and swimming pool facilities are popular for expatriates. Condominiums, apartments, semi-detached, terraced houses and large detached bungalows are available to rent with rental prices being more expensive closer to the Kuala Lumpur city centre.

It is worth noting that rental accommodation will be listed as furnished or unfurnished. Depending on the landlord, unfurnished properties may not include kitchen units or curtains. The initial duration for a standard rental agreement is 2 years which requires a refundable security deposit of 2 months' rent and an additional deposit for utilities.

Expatriates new to Malaysia are often amazed at how inexpensive supplies and services are especially when compared to Europe – though there are times when it is necessary to remember that Malaysia is a developing country. Most expatriates choose to bank with HSBC due to the ease of accessing and transferring money to their home countries.



Transportation

Most expatriates choose to travel by car as a convenient mode of transportation. Options for car transport include using the ride app Grab, renting or purchasing a car. Other types of transport such as bus and train are available but are not as accessible outside of the Kuala Lumpur city centre.

Concord College International School Malaysia is conveniently located 15 minutes from KLIA airport making it very easy to access budget airlines for weekend trips to beach destinations in Malaysia and across Southeast Asia with Langkawi and Thailand being popular destinations due to proximity.
